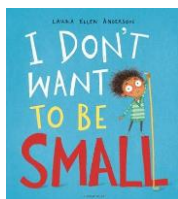


Recommended Reads Year R 2019-20

A small boy who desperately wants to be taller, tries all sorts of things to rescue his teddy, who is trapped in a tree out of reach. A great book to read aloud.

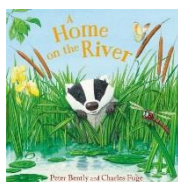


Antony, Steve – Amazing

A boy and his pet dragon are the very best of friends. They do everything together. A picture book that celebrates friendship and being yourself with a positive message about diversity.

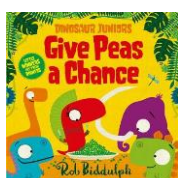

Y

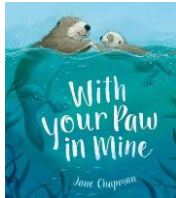
Raj and his dad are going camping and Raj knows they are going to have an amazing time. Once they get there, however, they find they must contend with wind, rain and a family of very noisy bears.

Y

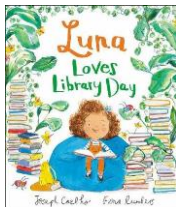
Two small penguins want to make friends but find themselves rejected by everyone they approach. The warm illustrations and heart-warming message about inclusion, are delivered with humour.

Y

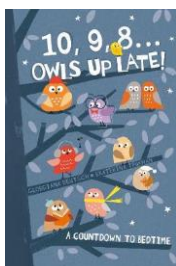
Luna has a day full of imagination when she spends the day at the library with her dad. As she explores the shelves they find books about magic, mystery, mummies and dinosaurs.

Y

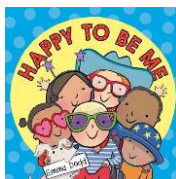
Rhyming verses tell readers they'll be loved until the scenarios described come to pass, and these grow more and more fantastical as the book progresses. A perfect book for sharing

Y

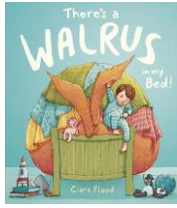
A rhyming counting story about 10 little owls who refuse to get ready for bed.

Y

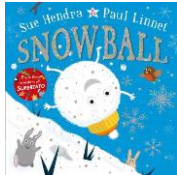
A delightful book with bright cheerful illustrations that celebrates bodies in all shapes and forms. It could be used to start discussions on the topic about Ourselves.

Y

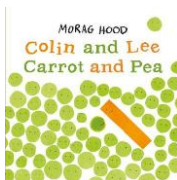

Y

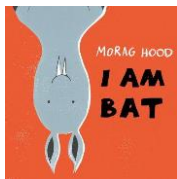
Snowball wants some excitement so he sets off to town, down a hill and experiences an eventful journey. An enjoyable rhyming adventure.

Funny story of two very different friends: a small green pea and a tall orange carrot stick.

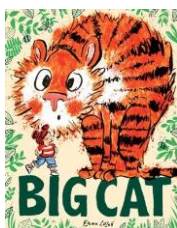


Hood, Morag – I Am Bat

Love, Jessica – Julian is a Mermaid

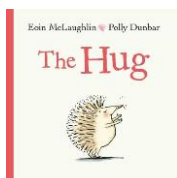
Y

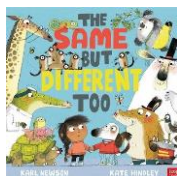

Y

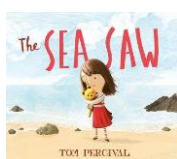

Y

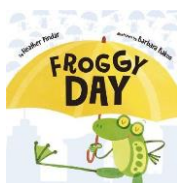

Y

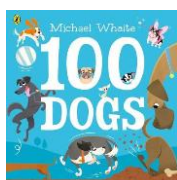
